



of the 331 buildings surveyed:

- 221 were categorised as Thatched
- 87 were categorised as Not thatched
- 23 were categorised as Unknown

Of those sites surveyed, 240 are Listed (37 at A, 153 at B, 50 at C) and 65 are not designated. Fifty three are on the buildings at risk register. Seven of the category A buildings were found to be ruinous.

Museum. The building was last re-thatched in 2010, in reed with a straw ridge, by Thatcher Graham Carter. According to NTS literature on display in the building, the roof would have been thatched in turf topped with



On the south east (front) elevation the thatch has been sculpted at the eaves above the three first floor window openings, whilst on the north west (rear) elevation there are two recessed window openings within the thatch, below which the roof has been slated to the eaves. The roof has been netted along the ridge only, whilst the rest of the thatch has been left uncovered.








A future for thatch in Scotland: HES Action Plan

- Demand





Actions

- Survey and designation review
- Identify best remaining examples and support / protect
- Monitor casework and lisaise with local authorities on best practice
- Publish technical guidance for home-owners
- Identify and promote best practice locally focussed
- Identify materials, manage these and make them accessible
- Engage with thatchers to understand skills and training needs
- Promote the Historic Environment Support Fund to building owners, allowing improved grant funding opportunities
- Raise awareness through outreach activities
- Actively seek collaboration with local community groups




